

WASHINGTON STATE BECOMES FIRST INCENTIVE IN THE COUNTRY TO RESERVE ITS FUNDING EXCLUSIVELY FOR LOCAL PROJECTS

Washington Filmworks is pleased to announce that it is the first production incentive program in the country to reserve its funding exclusively for projects that are creatively driven by Washington resident filmmakers. Known as 'Local Lens,' this groundbreaking new funding strategy is designed to maximize the impact of the funds in the Motion Picture Competitiveness Program (MPCP) and invest in our local creative community.

In addition to the incredible economic impact that local film projects have in communities across the state, 'Local Lens' will help create a sustainable industry by...

- ✓ Investing in local content creators
- ✓ Supporting a statewide talent pipeline
- ✓ Encouraging industry standard practices
- ✓ Putting Washington State in a league of its own that isn't dependent on the Hollywood model

Projects that are creatively driven by Washington residents will create more economic activity because they will spend more money with local businesses and hire more local cast and crew because Washington is where they live and work.

The Washington State film industry would like to thank the legislature for renewing the Motion Picture Competitiveness Program during the 2017 legislative session. Here is a snapshot of the important impact the program has had over the past 13 years!

Jobs and Dollars

- ✓ For every dollar awarded in funding assistance, the approved production generates an estimated \$10 of economic activity in our statewide economy, which is **\$10 of benefits for every \$1 invested.** **
- ✓ Since 2007, film projects approved through the program have brought in an estimated \$138 million in direct in-state spending.
- ✓ The MPCP helps rebuild the middle class and has created over 21,700 jobs for Washington workers. And we are the only production incentive in the country to require that approved productions provide health and retirement benefits for workers.

Statewide Impact

✓ Projects approved for funding assistance have spent money in every single legislative district in the state.

2019 IMPACT AT A GLANCE:

Washington Filmworks financially supported 4 projects in 2019, all of which were produced by women filmmakers that are WA residents. Productions filmed in diverse locations across Washington State including Spokane, Vantage, Wenatchee, Ellensburg, Goldbar, Snoqualmie, and Seattle. The projects all provided health and retirement benefits to cast and crew.
